### Kristi Boswell



Boswell serves as the Director of Congressional Relations in the Public Policy Department handling labor issues. ### John Newton



Newton is a Ph.D. student at the Ohio State University studying Agricultural Economics with an emphasis on dairy risk management. From February 2004 to September 2010, he worked for USDA-Dairy Programs as an auditor and market economist creating mathematical models and providing market information used in policy analysis. In the doctoral program, he is studying dairy risk management and policy analysis.

### Mary Knigge



For the past three years, Knigge has worked for the House Agriculture Committee and Ranking Member Collin Peterson. She is the lead staffer for the livestock subcommittee and she has been integrally involved in crafting dairy reform legislation. She works closely with government agencies when livestock issues arise and also deals with hearing preparation and constituent meetings.

### Dr. Bill Weldon



Dr. Weldon is the Vice President for Global Research and Development and Western Europe Operations. His responsibilities include Elanco's global research, development, and regulatory operations, as well as Western European Commercial Operations. These areas oversee the development and launch of new products and solutions that improve the health, wellness, wellbeing, and performance of animals.

### Leland Strom



Strom was appointed to a six-year term on the Farm Credit Administration Board by President George W. Bush on December 12, 2006. He was designated Chairman and CEO on May 22, 2008, and served in this capacity until November 26, 2012. He also serves as a board member for the Farm Credit System Insurance Corporation. Strom has been active in the agriculture industry for more than 30 years.

### Sam Miller



As Managing Director, Group Head of Agriculture Banking for BMO Harris Bank, Miller coordinates and leads production agriculture and agribusiness related banking activities. BMO Harris is the largest agricultural bank in Wisconsin and the eighth largest in the United States. Miller has over 29 years of agricultural banking experience, the past 25 at BMO Harris.

### Brent Wilson



Wilson owns and operates Wilson Centennial Farm, LLC, along with his wife and two sons. They milk 640 cows and farm 3,500 acres near Carson City, Michigan. The farm was a gold winner in the 2012 National Dairy Quality Awards. Wilson currently serves on the Michigan Milk Producers Association Board of Directors. He is also the Chairman of the Board of Carson Health Systems and a past board member of GreenStone Farm Credit Services.

### Keith Sterner



Dr. Sterner completed his DVM degree in 1969. He served in the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps from 1970-1972, then entered private practice in Ionia, Michigan. He was in this practice from 1972 as an owner and partner until his retirement in late 2011. He has been active in organized veterinary medicine, serving as both officer and committee member in the AABP, NMC, AVMA, and FDA and MVMA.

### Dr. Mike Siemens



Dr. Siemens was raised on a diversified farming operation in northern Indiana and obtained his BS from Purdue University, and his MS in Reproductive Physiology and PhD in Ruminant Nutrition from the University of Missouri. At Cargill, he holds the position of Leader, Animal Welfare and Husbandry, where he oversees animal welfare efforts for the global meat businesses.

#### **Professor Christopher Hurt**



Professor Hurt is a leading expert on the economics of livestock and meat marketing. A 30-year veteran of the Purdue agriculture department, his areas of focus include pricing strategies, livestock futures market, and livestock futures market performance. He also provides analysis for participation in government programs, teaches marketing principles and alternatives, evaluates the livestock industry structure, and provides price analysis and outlook of live cattle and live hogs.

#### **Joe Duscher**



Duscher is the Chief Operating Officer for Upstate Niagara Cooperative. He has worked in all aspects of cooperative management, including distribution, production, sales, and marketing. Duscher is active in a variety of industry organizations including the National Frozen & Refrigerated Food Retailer's Association and the National Ice Cream Mix Association, where he is currently the Vice President. #### **George York**

York is a Deputy Assistant United States Trade Representative in USTR's Office of Intellectual Property and Innovation, and covers Europe and international institutions, including the World Trade Organization, the World Intellectual Property Organization, and the World Health Organization, and the United Nations. Prior to joining USTR, he served as a Trade Council for the United States House of Representatives Committee on Ways and Means, where he was responsible for intellectual property among other issues.

Today, as many as 27 varieties of Classic Italian cheeses are produced and distributed nationwide and abroad. Auricchio is currently the Chairman of the Consortium for Common Food Names.

Dr. Antosch is responsible for overseeing, planning, developing, and implementing programs and projects addressing policy development and emerging environmental and energy policy issues. He is responsible for reviewing and analyzing environmental data, reports, and proposed rules and legislation to determine its impact on Ohio agriculture and producers.
