The National Milk Producers Federation welcomes the opportunity to provide comments to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) on the proposed rule to address sanitary transportation of human and animal food. The National Milk Producers Federation (NMPF), based in Arlington, VA, develops and carries out policies that advance the well-being of dairy producers and the cooperatives they own. The members of NMPF's cooperatives produce the majority of the U.S. milk supply, making NMPF the voice of more than 32,000 dairy producers on Capitol Hill and with government agencies. NMPF appreciates the efforts of FDA to work with all stakeholders to improve the safety of the food supply during the implementation phase of the various provisions of the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA). NMPF submitted comments jointly with the International Dairy Foods Association with respect to the impact of the proposed rule on the dairy industry in general; additionally, NMPF offers the following comments specific to the issue of animal feed on dairy farms.

NMPF seeks clarification from FDA about the application of the proposed regulations to a dairy farmer that is transporting bulk animal feed in their own vehicle from a facility to their own farm. In this scenario, the dairy farmer is operating as both the receiver and the carrier, and has assumed possession of the animal feed upon loading. Therefore, it is reasonable for the dairy farmer to maintain records as a receiver but, as the animal feed is no longer in commerce, transport of the shipment to the dairy farm should be exempt from the carrier's requirements for sanitary transportation and recordkeeping. Any risk for contamination or adulteration during transport to the farm has been accepted by and will be managed by the dairy farmer as the owner of the feed.

NMPF agrees that, should a third party or a feed mill serve as the carrier of the animal feed to the farm, the sanitary transportation requirements would be applicable to

ensure the safety of the animal feed being transported. However, when the end-user of the animal feed is also the carrier – as in the scenario of a dairy farmer transporting feed to their own farm – the shipment is no longer in commerce and would seem to be outside the scope of the current proposal.

NMPF welcomes the opportunity to further engage in productive dialogue and collaborate with FDA on the issue of food safety and to determine how to best achieve our common goal of assuring a safe and wholesome supply of milk and dairy foods.
